


Zainab Abid (Teacher Assistant)

## Reseach Project "DisTerrMem"



In the Summer of 2023, Dr. Younas was at the University of Warsaw, Poland, and Vytautas Magnus University (VDU), Kaunas, Lithuania, for a research project on Disputed Territories and Memory. Horizon 2020, the European Union's prestigious research and innovation program, funded it. During this academic engagement, Dr Younas remained involved in the following activities:

- Attended secondment in Warsaw and Kaunas and spent two months researching the politics of memory and borders at the University of Warsaw and VDU.
- Presented his research findings in a conference with other researchers, faculty members, and staff of the University of Warsaw and VDU. He discussed colonialism, democracy, and politics in Pakistan.



- Co-authored chapter, "Politics of Memory, Colonization and Democracy in Pakistan" accepted for publication in the Book, "Pathways to Agonism: Theoretical and Practical Approaches to the Memories of Disputed Territories" (due in November 2023) by Brill publisher.

Delivered a talk at the University of Management & Technology, highlighting the future and importance of Political Science and **International Relations.** 




#### **Students Internships**



#### **International Conferences**





The international conference "Challenging Borders in Domestic and International Human Rights Conference" took place at Albion College in Michigan, US, from April 30 to May 2, 2023. Under my supervision as a faculty mentor, three students from Forman Christian College, Ayesha Butt (MPhil-Political Science), Amena Aamir, and Fatima Aamir (Baccalaureate-Psychology), presented a panel presentation titled "Relevance of Human Rights in the Human Rights Debates: A Case Study of Selected Muslim Countries." This academic gathering debated global human rights challenges, fostering meaningful conversations, idea exchange, and valuable connections. Our panel received appreciation from all the delegates.



### The AMICAL conference for libraries, technolog and pedagogy



From May 24th to 26th, 2023, I attended AMICAL 2023 at Al Akhawayn University in Ifrane, Morocco. In the community idea exchange session, I discussed my fall 2022 "Student-Teacher Oral History Interview Project", which was accepted for the Digital Oral History Cohort Program by AMICAL's Digital Liberal Arts programs.



Through this project, my students with interview skills, ethical considerations, and transcription techniques using the Oral History in the Liberal Arts-OHLA website. AMICAL introduced me to novel teaching approaches, especially incorporating AI tools like ChatGPT, which are increasingly relevant in academia. This experience broadened my perspective on innovative teaching methodologies and their application in the evolving education landscape.

In the Spring of 2023, Dr. Abeeda offered a post-graduate course on the politico-strategic dynamics of the Middle East. It was the lofty ideals of encouraging students to read some recent academic works on the Middle East and to make them familiar with the ins and outs of publishing on their own, which were pursued by Dr. Abeeda when she asked every student to write a book review each and submit it to a peer-reviewed academic journal for publication. Not only was the class able to produce excellent book reviews, but three of the students' book reviews were accepted as publications in peer-reviewed journals. The book titled Swept Aside, A Story of Christian Sweepers in Lahore was published by Folio Books in April 2023. This book is based on Dr.Ayra's doctoral dissertation, which investigated the intersections of gender, caste, and labor producing multiple disadvantages for women. It critically describes and analyses the histories and structural forces that shape Christian communities as religious minorities and oppressed castes. The book was well received and reviewed by the three leading English newspapers in Pakistan namely, Dawn, The News, and Daily Times. The book was formally launched by the Centre for Public Policy and Governance, FCCU on 22nd March, 2023.

- Good as a subject




I am a political science major, and I believe the subject actually depends on the teacher.

# PAKISTAN'S CONSTITUTIONAL TURMOIL IN 2023

Since independence Pakistan has been at crossroads regarding it's fluent functioning of government. We can find it's illustration in the creation of our first constitution which took us about 9 years. We also find such incidents where the institutions sided the unconstitutional acts; let us not forget General Musharraf coup which was termed legal by Supreme court under doctrine of necessity but in 2007 when Musharraf declared emergency and suspended constitution his action was termed illegal by Judiciary. In reaction to it Musharraf imposed Provisional Constitutional Order (PCO) under which almost 50 judges were removed who were involved in this decision and new bench was formed which uphold Musharraf decision of emergency. It would be not to say wrong that the motto of Pakistani political parties has always been to remain in power for it they have always tried to oust the party in power that's why we had 29 prime ministers since 1947 and none of them completed a full five-year term and that's why we also have history full of constitutional crisis. Likewise, our past the current scenario of Pakistan constitutional crisis is in front of us which started in 2022 and in 2023 it turned into it'sworst conditions.

In 2023, Pakistan witnessed a tumultuous start to the year marked by political instability and division within the country. This period was characterized by a prominent opposition movement, spearheaded by former Prime Minister Imran Khan, challenging the authority of both the military and the existing coalition government. The nation found itself at a critical juncture, grappling with the implications of this political upheaval as it unfolded. At the onset of 2023, Pakistan experienced the dissolution of the KPK and the Punjab assemblies.

The elections ought to be conducted within 90 days as instructed by the Constitution in Article 224. More than 9 months have elapsed since the elections were initially announced to take place for the formation of the new Government by the Caretaker set-up. On the ground, it seems like the caretaker Government forgot the premise that they were only here to "assist the Commission to hold elections in accordance with law".

The elections ought to be conducted within 90 days as instructed by the Constitution in Article 224. More than 9 months have elapsed since the elections were initially announced to take place for the formation of the new Government by the Caretaker set-up. On the ground, it seems like the caretaker Government forgot the premise that they were only here to "assist the Commission to hold elections in accordance with law".



Nor only they failed to assist the commission, but they also violated the constitution of Pakistan by presenting a mammoth budget for the fiscal year for 23-24 as the Elections Act 2017. This move shows that the concerned authorities are not at all informed or concerned about the activities of the caretaker government which in turn shows that the constitution has no binding authority whatsoever.

Whereas, in regard of elections the President of Pakistan wrote a letter to the Election Commission of Pakistan as per the article 48b "Where the President the National Assembly, notwithstanding anything contained in clause, he shall, appoint a date, not later than ninety days from the date of the dissolution, for the holding of a general election to the Assembly" and requested the Chief Election Commissioner to meet the President to set the elections date. The Election Commission of Pakistan declined to meet the President quoting Section 57 of Elections Act 2017, Sultan Raja stated that "the meeting would be of no use as it is the sole responsibility of the Election Commission to announce the date as per the Elections Act".

Moving on, we also saw that The Pakistani Constitution's articles 10, ,19, and 10A were also flagrantly violated by the same responsible officials, who acted swiftly to make arrests from the Islamabad High Court's grounds. The arrests were done in reaction to the 9 May incidents which were termed as a "Black day" in history of Pakistan by ISPR. While, In this context, military courts were used for trails but later on it was declared null and void by Supreme court of Pakistan and shifted trials to civilian courts. The arrests were criticized by Human watch as peaceful protesters were also arrested, they claimed that "the violators should be punished but those who adhered to peaceful protests and means they shouldn't be arbitrary detained".



So, In conclusion, the constitutional crisis in Pakistan during 2023 was a multifaceted issue characterized by political instability, unilateral decision-making, and legislative alterations. It's irony for Pakistan that it's leaders claim that "democracy is the only way forward" & "No one is above law" but in reality we see things contrary to it. In Animal farm George Orwell sketch's out this scenario as "those who control the government claims, "We all animals are equal, but some animals are more equal than others".

#### NAVIGATING GENDER EQUALITY IN PAKISTAN: A CLOSER LOOK AT ISLAMIC AND WESTERN FEMINISM


The current situation of women in Pakistan is a complex mixture of progress and ongoing struggles. Significant legal reforms have been implemented, while various civil society organizations, including those influenced by Islamic feminist principles, have dedicated themselves to empowering women. Despite these efforts, deep-rooted cultural norms and barriers within society remain major obstacles to achieving full gender equality in the country. In the global fight for gender equality, two important movements that have played significant roles are Western feminism and Islamic feminism. Both movements aim to challenge patriarchal norms and advocate for a fair and inclusive society for people of all genders.

Let's first discuss the evolution of Western feminism, which took place through multiple waves, each with its distinctive features. The initial wave, appearing in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, centered on achieving women's right to vote and other legal entitlements. In contrast, the second wave, spanning from the 1960s to the 1980s, broadened its focus to encompass reproductive rights, workplace bias, and violence based on gender. More recently, the third wave emerged in the 1990s and persists today to acknowledge how gender intersects with race, class, sexual orientation, and other social identities.

Built on the idea of equality between genders, Western feminism is rooted in a secular and humanist ideology rather than religious beliefs. This movement has advocated for various issues, such as reproductive autonomy, fair wages, and addressing violence based on gender. It has been greatly influenced by notable figures like Betty Friedan, author of "The Feminine Mystique," Gloria Steinem, and Angela Davis, who is recognized for her efforts towards ending mass incarceration and promoting racial equity. These influential individuals have greatly impacted Western feminist ideals and activism, motivating future generations to strive for a more inclusive and fair society.

The emergence of Islamic feminism in the late 20th century sought to unite Islamic teachings and feminist principles in modern society. This movement challenges patriarchal interpretations of Islamic texts, which have long been used to justify gender inequality, by emphasizing that such interpretations are not true reflections of Islam or fair. Prominent figures within the movement, such as Amina Wadud and Fatima Mernissi, have made notable advancements in developing new interpretations of Islamic texts and promoting the importance of social reforms for achieving a more egalitarian society.

A multifaceted movement, Islamic feminism advocates the rights of women to education, employment, and political participation, as well as eliminating gender-based violence discrimination. The movement also aims to create a more inclusive and diverse understanding of Islam that recognizes the rights and dignity of all individuals, regardless of their gender identity. An important contribution of Islamic feminism is its new interpretation of Islamic texts, which offers an alternative perspective on traditional teachings. As a result, conventional beliefs about women in Islam are challenged and new insights are revealed. Amina Wadud, for example, interpreted the Quranic text in a way that enabled women to lead congregational prayers, traditionally a male-dominated practice. Islamic feminism is a progressive, empowering movement that seeks to reconcile Islamic teachings with modern feminist theories. To create a society where everyone can live with dignity and respect, this movement advocates social reform and gender



In recent years, Pakistan has taken important steps towards legal reforms aimed at enhancing the rights of women. These reforms have encompassed a variety of new laws that tackle critical concerns including workplace harassment, inheritance, domestic violence, and discrimination. A notable example is the Protection against Harassment of Women at the Workplace Act of 2010, which serves as a crucial tool for safeguarding women's rights by establishing a legal structure for preventing and addressing workplace harassment - a prevalent issue among women in Pakistan.

The Criminal Law (Amendment) Act, introduced in 2016, was introduced to address the persistent problem of crimes against women in Pakistan. This legal reform aimed to strengthen the legal framework for addressing crimes against women and introduced tougher penalties for offenses such as rape, acid attacks, and honour killings. Pakistan's women's rights were significantly protected with the introduction of this act. As part of the effort to combat gender-based discrimination in Pakistan, several legislative changes have been made. Muslim Family Laws Ordinances were amended in 2015, which provided women with greater inheritance rights. This revision helped address the issue of inheritance, which has traditionally been biased against women in Pakistan.



"These legal reforms represent a positive shift in Pakistan's legal system towards addressing genderbased crimes and discrimination. They are essential steps toward protecting and enhancing the rights of women and promoting gender equality."

Despite legal reforms, cultural norms and societal challenges persist as significant obstacles to gender equality in Pakistan. Because of deeply ingrained cultural and patriarchal norms, women face barriers to education, employment, and participation in public life. Child marriages, honour killings, limited access to resources, and discriminatory practices plague society today.

In Pakistan, civil society organizations such as the Aurat Foundation and Shirkat Gah play a vital role in advocating for women's rights and gender equality. To empower women, these organizations engage in educational initiatives, legal advocacy, and socioeconomic support. It aims to interpret Islamic teachings to promote women's rights and challenge patriarchal norms, influencing activism and advocacy for gender equality. Women in Pakistan currently face a complex mix of advances and challenges. In addition, civil society organizations, including those influenced by Islamic feminist principles, have made concerted efforts to empower women through legal reforms. Despite this, deeply entrenched cultural norms and societal barriers continue to obstruct full gender
